





"First of all I would like to congratulate you on the excellent job you are doing with getting us all back in touch.

Here is a short bio of mine.

It is not easy to put 50 years in a couple of pages , and I would not like to tire you with a lot of details.

<u>September 1964:</u> I am taking up my first job with the American firm's Macy's and the May Co. Athens Office, as Secretary-Assistant Buyer.

<u>September 1965:</u> New job with the newly created Branch of the International Wool Secretariat (Pure Virgin Wool) in Athens. I worked there for 20 years, in a perfect environment, as Secretary to the Branch Director during the first five years and then as Public Relations Officer-Fashion Adviser. A very interesting job, which involved organizing Fashion Shows, participations to Fashion Fairs and Exhibitions, publications of leaflets, bulletins and a lot of travelling.

<u>In March 1985,</u> after a drastic elimination of personnel, I decided to resign, due to change of the Branch's management.

In the meantime I was married to Nick Polyzos. My last name is POLYZOU. It is the female of Nick's last name which is POLYZOS (Greek grammar!!!!).

Nick and I had two sons (Themis, born in 1975 and Stathis, born in 1980). I stayed at home as a housewife for five years and then worked for two years with a friend who had a Travel Agency specialized in Business Travel. After that I got an early retirement pension.

My sons are now married. One is living in Athens (he has an 11-months old daughter) and the other is living in a city at about 500 miles from Athens (he has a 7-years old daughter and a 5-years old son). Both boys as well as their wives have nice jobs, which is a blessing under the present circumstances in Greece.

I will send you pictures around Christmas when my son and his family will be spending the holidays with us. I need his help to scan and attach the photos to the mail.

During all these years, I have travelled to several countries in Europe (England, Italy, Germany, Spain), as well as to Morocco, Africa.

I also returned twice to the U.S.A. in December 1978 in New York and in June 1996 on a tour to several States and cities, when I came to Salinas for two days, trying to find old acquaintances, but in vain. Everything looked different.

Now, I am living 8 months in Athens and 4 months in a small village by the sea at about an hour and a half drive from Athens. While in Athens, I go often to the movies, to the theater and to concerts. I also enjoy going out for coffee or for a drink with friends. .My husband and I also travel to visit our son's family who live away from Athens and help with the other grandchild in Athens. During summer, we host our grandchildren and children in our house by the sea. It is a heavy duty but so rewarding!

Besides that, I do a lot of reading and listening to music .I used to like travelling, but since September 11, I became a little hesitant.


Before closing, I need to say that the year I spent in Salinas really changed my life. Besides the language and the business education I had during that year, I became a more confident and mature person and this was a great advantage for making a good life. Getting again in touch with you and Salinas brought back so many memories, which I did not know they existed. I get so excited every time I see in the Facebook photos of Salinas or read about things that used to take place those days.

I hope, if all goes well, to be able and make it to the reunion. But this is something that I cannot plan so many months ahead. My only concern is that I may not find accommodation when the plans are final. We'll see.

When I lived in Salinas I was keeping a diary.



"Here's a little more info about the untimely demise of Steve Owen. He and several other Bruce Church employees were flying back from either Yuma or El Centro on the Bruce Church company plane (I believe it was a twin engine Beechcraft Baron) and hit bad weather approaching Salinas. They were in contact with a local control tower and requested landing assistance. Now, here's where the story gets a little sketchy. In one version the tower gave instructions which the pilot disregarded. In the other version the pilot thought he was in contact with either Monterey or Salinas but was in fact on contact with Fremont control, so any directions given would not apply to his current situation.

Either way, the plane crashed into the Gabilan mountains somewhere in the general vicinity of Fremont Peak. If memory serves, none aboard survived.'' From




Then we had to bowl a couple games; first in a year for me.

ANDRUS JEWELERS CLOSING 236 Main Street, Salinas

Andrus Jewelers, an iconic Oldtown Salinas jewelry store founded during the Eisenhower administration, is closing its doors, owner Jeff Andrus said Tuesday



morning. Jeff Andrus, pictured at Andrus Jewelers in Salinas. After many years of service to the community, the store, founded by his parents Alva and Rosemary, is closing its doors.

Andrus, the second generation to run the store, said he is retiring and taking on other interests. "The decision to close our family business was one of the most difficult I've ever had to make," Andrus said. "My parents, Alva and Rosemary, opened the doors during the '50s, so I literally grew up in the business. But it's time for a decisive move."

More than 1,500 mailings went out to Salinas-area residents, young and old, announcing the closing and the sale, he said. That's a customer base that would make any Oldtown merchant salivate.

On Tuesday, Andrus and his four-person staff were busy putting up discount cards – 30 to 60 percent off – on the entire inventory. He wasn't tipping his hand about what endeavor is next on his agenda, and was modest about steering a successful

jewelry retailer since taking over from his father, who died in January 2007 at the age of 85.

Instead, he simply expressed "gratitude for all the wonderful relationships and trust our customers placed with us. I really want this to be about my father's legacy."

Certainly that is a legacy any long-time Salinas resident will remember. Alva Andrus, born in San Luis Obispo and reared in Salinas, learned watchmaking while working at Salinas jewelry store Goodfriend & Traub for 16 years.

He and his wife of 62 years, Rosemary, bought one of his employers' locations in 1953 – the same year he began serving on the Salinas City Council. His reputation in Salinas was beyond reproach.

"He was the most honest man I've ever known – to a fault," Jeff Andrus said. "We've just carried on that tradition. In our business, that's everything."


Jeff Andrus and his wife, Liz, took over the company in 1988. There is little doubt that competition has gotten stiffer with more jewelers vying for fewer customer dollars. But the way to beat the big-box jewelers and the mall shops is by building a loyal customer base.

"We just do the best we can and try to treat our customers right," he said.

With a recent spate of store closings, another closing might have sent chills down the spines of economic development folks in Salinas. But in this case, it was all about Andrus wanting to strike out in a new direction. Revenues have grown incrementally for each of the 60 years, he said.

Jeff Andrus will leave his own legacy as the longest-lasting jeweler in Salinas and likely in Monterey County.


