

You can see in the background the rim of what remains of a volcano that blew around 1400 bc, geologically just a blink. Its crater became Lake Taupo (easily as big as Lake Tahoe), which is the source of the Waikato. There are several VERY active volcanoes in the region and just last month Ruapehu let off a few tons of debris. In 1995, there was a big eruption which caused a lahar to flow down and cover the main north/south train track. We got a lot of dust and beautiful sunsets up our way because of it.





Wayback Machine:

The great blizzard of '62;

now that was cold

We Salinas Valleyites have a small tolerance for weather extremes. When it's hotter than 75 degrees it's too hot; when it dips below 60 we shiver.

I'm not talking about the hearty folks who live in the southern portion of our fecund vale — folks in Bradley, Jolon, San Miguel, San Ardo and even King City know what it's like to go from real hot to real cold real quickly.

Naw, it is we who live north and west of Spence Road and closer to the ocean who are the thin-skinned ones. Our week-long cold snap last week was just about all the winter we could bear.

But we come from strong stock, those who survived the great Blizzard of

Jan. 21, 1962 — 51 years ago today.

As blizzards go, this one was modest, but it remains the most widespread, longest-lasting snow storm to hit Monterey County in living memory. Yeah, I remember last year when a few flakes hit the ground in Salinas and stuck for awhile. And in the late 1970s, King City and Corral de Tierra were transformed into winter wonder lichés. We expect Mount Toro and Fremont Peak to be blanketed once or twice a winter.

But trust me: the 1962 snow event was unique. It was so bad that the final round of the Bing Crosby Golf Tournament in Pebble Beach was cancelled; no round of golf had ever been called off on the old crooner's watch and it was the first time since 1949 that a sanctioned Professional Golf Association event had not come at least a 54-hole conclusion.

On Jan. 21, 1962, every square inch of Monterey County woke up to snow, real snow, so-long-lasting-you-can-go-out-and-play-in-it snow.

It covered the county from Peachtree Valley to Point Sur and from Pajaro to Pleyto.

The blizzard hit in the wee hours of Sunday morning and continued for much of the day. Prunedale in particular was blessed, with snow continuing through Monday morning.

Snowdrifts closed parts of Highway 101 for a while, causing a massive traffic jam. Hundreds of north county children were stranded Monday morning when their school buses couldn't function in the unusual weather and got an unexpected day off to play in the stuff.

The snowstorm not only caught residents by surprise, it fooled the experts, too. Cmdr. Paul Wolff, officer in charge of the U.S. Navy's Fleet Numerical unit in Monterey, said it blindsided the military's computer-aided prognosticators, though computer in the 1960s were not nearly as sophisticated as they are now.

"(The weather computer) has a lot of (climate) history built into it," he said at the time. "It just doesn't have any experience with weather as unusual as this."

The surprise storm was the child of two storms going in different directions. A mass of Arctic air over southwestern Canada collided with a typical Pacific storm moving east over Utah. Strong winds sent the combined storms on an unusual southwest course, covering Oregon and California with a layer of cold air — and a ton of snow.

How much snow actually fell? No one was quite sure how to measure it. The National Weather Service reported an inch of snow and .63 of an inch of rain. How they determined how much of which was what remains a mystery. It wasn't particularly cold that Jan. 21. The high temperature was 39; the low 31.

At Pebble Beach, Bing and his friends didn't let the cancellation of his tournament turn into wasted time. Pro golfer Gardner Dickenson practiced his putting with a snowball, and Arnold Palmer and Jimmy Demaret got into a snowball fight. Elsewhere in Monterey County, it was a slow day for Sunday school teachers as every kid — from age 75 to newborn — built battalions of snowmen until the heatless sun went down.

Such a day.




THIS IS WHY WE KEEP COMING BACK (This sounds like something I could write. But alas, I didn't...csw)

Though adulthood has shown me to be a clear-cut extrovert, I was unable to access that quality amid the agony of self-consciousness that drowned me in high school.


So – once a decade—reunions have become that rare opportunity for <u>a do-over</u>.






NICE TO SEE YOU AGAIN
