A DAY IN THE LIFE

ON THE HORSE BREEDING RANCH

DOWN UNDER

The horses take up most of my day. The maintenance of the property is never ending and there is only me to do it.

To give you an example, although the farm is just under 10 acres, it is fenced with four rail fencing that is painted black. We have a very humid climate which means everything has mould on it including the fencing. Fence spraying contractors won't spray small blocks, so owners have to do their own. I calculated once that there are at least 12-13 kilometres of fencing (both sides and top and bottom) to spray with an anti-mould solution then paint. It doesn't take weeks.... It takes months.

A bit like the Golden Gate Bridge.

As soon as the painters finish painting the bridge, they start all over again.

Then there are the hedges. And the paddock slashing (grass grows so fast here that the animals can't keep up with it so it has to be regularly slashed otherwise seed heads form). My neighbours and I often complain about the monotony of it. Moreover, it's quite solitary, so I'm often talking to myself. The land and the animals dictate my life. Like children, you HAVE to do what they need.

It all sounds very glamourous to be raising thoroughbreds, but unless you have staff like the big studs, the work is constant and never-ending. To be honest, I will only be able to do this for a couple of more years because my body just can't take the wear and tear. I can no longer change the attachments to my tractor because my hands simply don't have the strength anymore. I used to be able to remove the slasher on my own or put the front loader on. Not now. I rely on a freelance horse handler to help me with the yearlings when it's a two-person job, but mostly I am on my own. I find it isolating at times in the middle of a busy rural community.

And as for a social life, Cambridge is a small agricultural town without much nightlife except the pubs. Not my style.

Oh, for a week in San Francisco!




We all loved going to movies, football games, plays, proms, dragging Main, etc. Happy days for sure!






If you're too young to appreciate the Lone Ranger and Tonto, or to know who Scout and Silver were, well, that will hopefully change for the better beginning July 3.



I say, "for the better" because trailers promoting the new "Lone Ranger" film starring Armie Hammer and Johnny Depp have been running non-stop for weeks. You know the Disney clip with the masked man riding Silver, his white stallion, through a series of moving train cars.

At that point, I slap my forehead and say, "Here we go again."



My hope is that the legend, as well as the movie, survives the Hollywood treatment, because the Lone Ranger and Tonto are great American legends, and the only thing that can kill them or tarnish their sterling (silver) reputations is over-exposure. That

plus a line-up of fiery Hollywood special effects staged more for their kinetic energy than their dramatic impact.

The Lone Ranger and Tonto are the best-known Old West icons among those who grew up beginning in the mid-1930s and then on TV into the 1950s. In true

multimedia fashion, the two characters also showed up in comic books and on the big movie screen. Certainly, the show made composer Gioachino Rossini's finale from the "William Tell Overture," the Lone Ranger's theme song, the most-played piece of classical music in America.

I first saw the Lone Ranger and Tonto on one of the earliest TVs in the neighborhood, a 12-inch black and white screen set in a heavy wooden case. Our hero would fire a few well-targeted silver bullets then he and Tonto would ride off to bring justice to those in need.






The story as to how the two paired up is likewise meant to be simple. Outlaws ambush six Texas Rangers, killing all but one. Tonto comes upon the ambush scene by accident. He nurses the wounded ranger back to health. The two then head out in search of the attackers and to fight for law and order. In the simplicity resides the power of the legend.




Several actors have played the roles. My favorite Lone Ranger was Clayton Moore, who died in 1999. Moore had the smoothly fashioned authoritative voice. Not to forget the outfit — black cowboy boots, gray shirt and pants, white cowboy hat and black mask.



My fear, from what I've seen on the movie trailers, is that Hollywood has taken that simple and powerful story of good versus evil and diluted its impact with flashy

special effects and flip one-liners. Plus, Johnny Depp fell off his horse, I read.

Tonto would never make that mistake.
