






Salinas, Fifteen Minutes of Fame

A Public Broadcasting Service team has been filming <u>our Main Street</u> this past week, interviewing the people who work and live along that dramatically varied corridor.



The interviews are to be part of "Main Street." That's a segment of PBS' "Need to Know" program.

"We visit specific main streets and look at the issues and challenges that those people face," said John Larson, with the PBS production team.

The idea for such coverage arose with the realization that politicians, trying to enhance their own credibility by touting bogus links "to the people of Main Street," had instead cheapened that phrase and all of the noble values it stands for. With its interviews, the PBS effort intends to shed light on concerns of average Americans, while at the same time restoring "main street" to its rightful iconic standing.

"We visit specific main streets," Larson said, taking minutes out of his tight schedule. "We interview people on issues and challenges like medical insurance."

Among other stopping points, the team <u>visited Salinas High School</u>.




It went to the National Steinbeck Center



and the great hole in the earth that is to become the Taylor Farms headquarters in the 100 block.

Larson even showed up at Sunday morning services at <u>St. Paul's Episcopal Church</u>, 1071 Pajaro St.



John Steinbeck was a member when the church was at a different location, and a church picture shows him in the choir. Larson took the organist and a church member to breakfast at <u>First Awakenings</u> for an informal chat.



"The idea is to cover Main Street end to end", he said.

The program isn't a travelogue, but I hope PBS works in a bit of Main Street history.

<u>Like when Main Street also doubled as U.S. 101</u>. In those days, Hollywood stars and three presidents, too, stopped to stay, and fine brandy and cigars were always at the ready at the <u>Cominos and other classy Salinas hotels</u>.



Then the <u>parades. Many were rodeo-related</u>, and Main Street was their route. Just some sense of the rich uniqueness of that street, in other words.



Since the team visited Salinas High School, I hope it mentions that school's dramatic comeback from decay and ruin. That, too, shows something about the spirit of Main Street, as well as the spirit of Salinas residents.

Larson, by the way, was impressed by the beauty of the <u>city's setting</u>, <u>with distant</u> mountains to either side and productive fields spreading across the valley floor.



"This is a blessed part of the country," he said.

The PBS group leaves Sunday. The segment runs nationally the evening of March 1.





Wayback Machine:

'63 Salinas Mets in a class of their own

We who reckon our years by the baseball schedule and not the calendar are rejoicing today as we ring in a new year. Mighty Casey and his Mudville Nine get to start over with a clean slate.



But this week also marks a significant local baseball anniversary: It's the 50th anniversary of the advent of the marvelous Salinas Mets. It was 50 years ago this week that professional baseball returned to Salinas after a five-year hiatus. And the word "marvelous" is applied to the 1963 Salinas Mets with the same affection as it was to their big brothers in New York: Both teams lost far more frequently than they won.

The Salinas Mets had some good players, some who went on to have solid Major League careers. And one player on the '63 Salinas club became part of a transaction that changed professional sports forever. But more on that later.

The Mets of 1963 won 49 games and lost 91, the worst season for a pro Salinas team until 1992, when Heidi Koga's Salinas Spurs ---- without a Major League affiliate working agreement and stocked mostly with young players from Japan --- finished 36-99, ending the city's on and off flirtation with the California League.



For a 14-year-old kid who lived about a half-mile from Municipal Stadium,




all it took was the mow a few neighborhood lawns and he'd earned the \$7 it took to buy a Junior Mets Boosters Club card --- essentially a season ticket. The pass was good for the bleachers along the left and right field lines, but if the crowd was small the ushers would pretend not to notice the Junior Boosters sneaking into the main grandstand.



The team was managed by Kenny Deal, a good ol' boy from Gastonia, N.C.,, and a long-time minor league pitcher in the Boston Red Sox chain. He had a couple of 20-win seasons, but never advanced Double-A Atlanta.

And when his Salinas pitching staff was depleted from overwork or shell shock,

he wrote his own name on the lineup card and pitched an inning or two.



They say it's hard for a pitcher to lose 20 games in the season, but the '63 Salinas Mets staff almost had two of its workhorses achieve that dubious note. Hal Haddock finished the campaign with a 10-21 record and a 4.77 earned run average. Leon Criner was 8-18, 5.36.

Gary Anderson hit a solid 285 in 1963. The next season, also in Salinas, saw Anderson pump up his power stats with eight home runs, but the average drop to .257./Hank McGraw/ The brother of relief ace Tug McGraw and uncle of County Western legend Tim McGraw was Salinas' power threat in 1963. He knocked 13 out of the park that year and 29 homers in 1964.



He never made it to the majors but spent 16 years in the minors, ending his career after the 1972 season.

According to a local urban legend, McGraw creamed a home run all the way across Maryal Drive and off the facade of Madonna del Sasso Church.



While Muni was still standing, I personally tested the theory and concluded that if indeed McGraw had hit a ball that far, it would have been foul./ Bob Serrano .227. He reached Class AA ball before his career ended in 1965.


Now, about that 1963 Salinas Mets player who was part of a deal that changed professional sports:

On Oct. 7, 1969, the Philadelphia Phillies trade Salinas alumnus Jerry Johnson, Richie Allen and Cookie Rojas to St. Louis for Byron Browne, Curt Flood, Joe Hoerner and Tim McCarver. Flood refused to report to Philadelphia setting off a multi-year battle against Major League Baseball's reserve clause. Flood took his case all the way to the U.S. Supreme Court. He lost the case, but the ruckus it caused led MLB to adopt the "10/5 Rule" in 1970, allowing players with 10 years of big league service and five with the same club to veto a trade. It also cracked the door open for free agency.

The 1964 Salinas Mets team --- with many players returning from the '63 squad --- was pretty good, finishing 79-59, second in the Cal League standings to the Fresno Giants.

But those 1963 Mets were worth every lawn mowed.
