That's one less excuse.









MEETING STEINBECK, SORT OF


75th anniversary of *The Grapes of Wrath*

We're in the midst of the Steinbeck Festival, but in one form or another Steinbeck — or reminders of Steinbeck — linger year around.

That's a good thing. He's our most famous native son, and he lived and played just down the block.



Reading his books — "Of Mice and Men" is a heart-wrenching favorite — is a mind-expanding voyage,



and the festival is a key stop-over in that process.


Yet, there's also a whole universe of Steinbeck-related experiences that are with those of us who live here year around. That would include the Steinbeck House Restaurant and the National Steinbeck Center, of course.



Stepping out the Church Street exit to The Salinas Californian, for example,



puts a person across the street from space once occupied by the original Salinas High School, which Steinbeck attended. Students nicknamed it "the brickyard."



Why? Because it was made of bricks, maybe. Plus, it lacked landscaping. The school got torn down. Today it's a parking lot populated by grim county-gray portable offices.

Heading into the John Steinbeck Library, you might bump into the diminutive Steinbeck likeness in the form of a garden statue. Inside, large photos of the author, including one of him reading The Salinas Californian, hang from a wall.



Walking to the Steinbeck House at 132 Central Avenue for lunch,



I'm walking into the same spaces in which Steinbeck played as a boy. He knew his neighborhood.



He knew the characters who lived in its houses. He knew many of their secrets, no doubt. The house today is a popular place to stop for lunch. Note: The waiting room is that same room in which he was born Feb. 27, 1902.

The experience of being in the Steinbeck House, by the way, can be overcoming. That seems true especially for Steinbeck fans who arrive, usually by tour bus. Because the Salinas author's works remain so universally acclaimed, it's not uncommon to see some of those visitors from Japan or Germany clutching their tour books and cameras and reduced to sudden tears by the emotions of the moment.

What single experience I enjoyed most, though, was my close encounter with Steinbeck or, perhaps in this case, Steinbeck's representative from the hereafter.

Back in the late 1900s, I believe it was, I was having lunch at Sang's Café, a restaurant on the 100 block of Main Street in which Steinbeck was said to have eaten.





I paid my bill and stepped out the door into the cool air. A lone figure came walking down the empty sidewalk towards me.

He wore a rumpled tweed jacket and wrinkled slacks and smoked an unfiltered Lucky Strike.



It was Steinbeck! I swear. I turned and watched — OK, I was gawking — as he walked by. Only when I got back to the newsroom did I learn that a Steinbeck impersonator was in Salinas to take part in a Steinbeck-related event.

I know that the author died in 1968. Still, the person I saw outside Sang's was Steinbeck, in town I'm guessing to check up on the old neighborhood.





Shelby is now home recuperating, after two hospital stays beginning sometime in April, and then readmitted on May 11. He returned home May 18 to a long recovery from ulcerative colitis . He originally was thought to have salmonella bacteria which brought on nauseous and abdominal pain. After many lab procedures and testing, a liquid diet , and a lot of weight loss, he was finally diagnosed.

This was message from wife Joanna when he returned home on May 18:

"They say he has Ulcerative Colitis. It will take him a while to get back up on his feet. I would like to thank everyone that took the time to come and see him several times in the hospital. That help kept his sprits up. And thank you everyone for all the prayers. Thank the ones that called me at home to check up on him. We love all of you."

Wishing him well and no more hospital stays.

<u>A SALINAS STORY NOT TO BE FORGOTTEN</u>

"Salinas lost more men per capita than any other town in the United States during the Death March."

Once there were 105 brave young men. Most were from the Salinas Valley. Decades ago, they marched off to do battle. They fought the enemy valiantly on distant shores.


Now, only three — Roy Diaz of Salinas, Manny Nevarez of Sparks, Nev., and Norman Rose of San Jose — remain alive. (All three passed away in 2013)

Each fought against the Japanese on Bataan in the Philippines in the opening months of World War II, and each survived one of the cruelest episodes of the war, the Bataan Death March, a murderous 70-mile slog. This year marks the 70th anniversary of the atrocity.

"The story of Company C is among the most dramatic of World War II," said Barry Wilson, with the Salinas Elks Lodge No. 614.

"Residents of Salinas should remember their connection to Bataan," he said.

That connection began one day in February 1941 when the unit paraded in crisp unison down Main Street.

Crowds lined five deep. From rooftops, from second-story windows, they cheered and waved.

When Japanese bombers attacked Pearl Harbor on Dec. 7, 1941, Company C was already deployed in the Philippines. It became one of the first U.S. armored units to engage the Imperial Japanese Army in battle. U.S. troops and their allies, though, were outnumbered.

Ammunition and medicine ran low. Food dwindled so that, to keep going, soldiers ate rats, worms, snakes and monkeys.

"We didn't have spare parts or nothing," Diaz, a tank mechanic, told The Salinas Californian in an earlier interview. Yet for four months the soldiers fought on.

Then, those still fighting on the Bataan Peninsula, including Company C, were surrendered.

That was April 9, 1942, some 70 years ago. Since Dec. 8, 1941, the unit had been in combat. Company C had lost 10 tanks. Six men had been killed in action.

Diaz, Rose and Nevarez were among those who became POWs.

Hell on Earth recalled

The Japanese showed no mercy to their new captives. They forced those captives to march to a prison camp 60 to 70 miles away. That march became the "Bataan Death March."

The bayoneting, beatings and shootings were a routine feature of the march.

"I remember the dead and the stench," Diaz, 95, said. "A body here, a body there. We wanted to bury the bodies, but the they said, 'No!"

Men from Company C were also forced to endure transport to Japan aboard "hell ships," unmarked Japanese freighters. The intent of the hell ships was to get the POWs to Japan, where they would be forced into slave labor.

Aboard the hell ships, the troops were packed in covered holds. There were no toilets. Dead bodies, on occasion, could not be immediately removed. At times, water was so scarce that the POWs were forced to drink urine.

Not realizing the Japanese ships were hauling American POWs, U.S. pilots and submarine captains often targeted the vessels.

<u>Diaz</u>, Nevarez and Rose were among the 47 men from the original 105-man Company C who made it home after the war.

Diaz was the last of the Company C survivors in the Salinas area. He lived in a remote section of Corral de Tierra on a gentle slope of land strewn with sunflowers.

He was a prisoner of war for 3 1/2 years in Japanese slave-labor camps.

In February 1941, he was one of 105 members of Company C, 194th Tank Battalion of the U.S. Army, largely made up of young men from the Salinas area. They had signed up for a National Guard unit that was converted.

In 1945, Diaz was one of only 47 men from Company C who made it home from war.

During his years as a POW, Diaz and his fellow soldiers endured forced labor and the threat of tropical disease. Rations were so meager that his weight fell from 150 pounds to a skeletal 85 pounds, which stretched the skin over his ribs.

Men were shot, bayoneted and beaten. Friends died.

Memories of such things never take the day off. Even on a birthday decades later, they were there, Diaz once said.

"I still think often of those events," he said of his unit's tragic journey through the war. "I think about it every day."

Life after war

After his return home, Diaz married Lorraine Sayers, who grew up near the Diaz farm. They wed in 1956 after meeting in 1955 at the Colmo del Rodeo parade. The couple lived on a parcel of that original Diaz property.

The land is the very same that John Steinbeck christened "The Pastures of Heaven." That would be near the end of San Benancio and the start of Corral del Cielo roads.






